defeat Gaston has been preparing for the 1922 Derby. His dog team will be practically the same as the one he used last year. He has been training his animals daily, and is believed to have developed the fastest set of dogs in the country.

Kent has already arrived in Ashton from his Targhee Forest home, and is confident of retaining his title. He has as many backers as his biggest rival, Gaston, and the contest promises to be a hard-

fought affair.

From the standpoint of the supporters of the respective teams, there will be but two in the dog Derby, although there are many others entered. This year the clash between Tud Kent and Smoky Gaston will be the climax of competition between these two fast mushers, which will assume the proportions of a grudge race.

But enough competition is promised to keep Gaston and Kent very busy in addition to their own twosided argument, and the thousands who journey to the scene of the canine contest will be treated to a real thrill.
